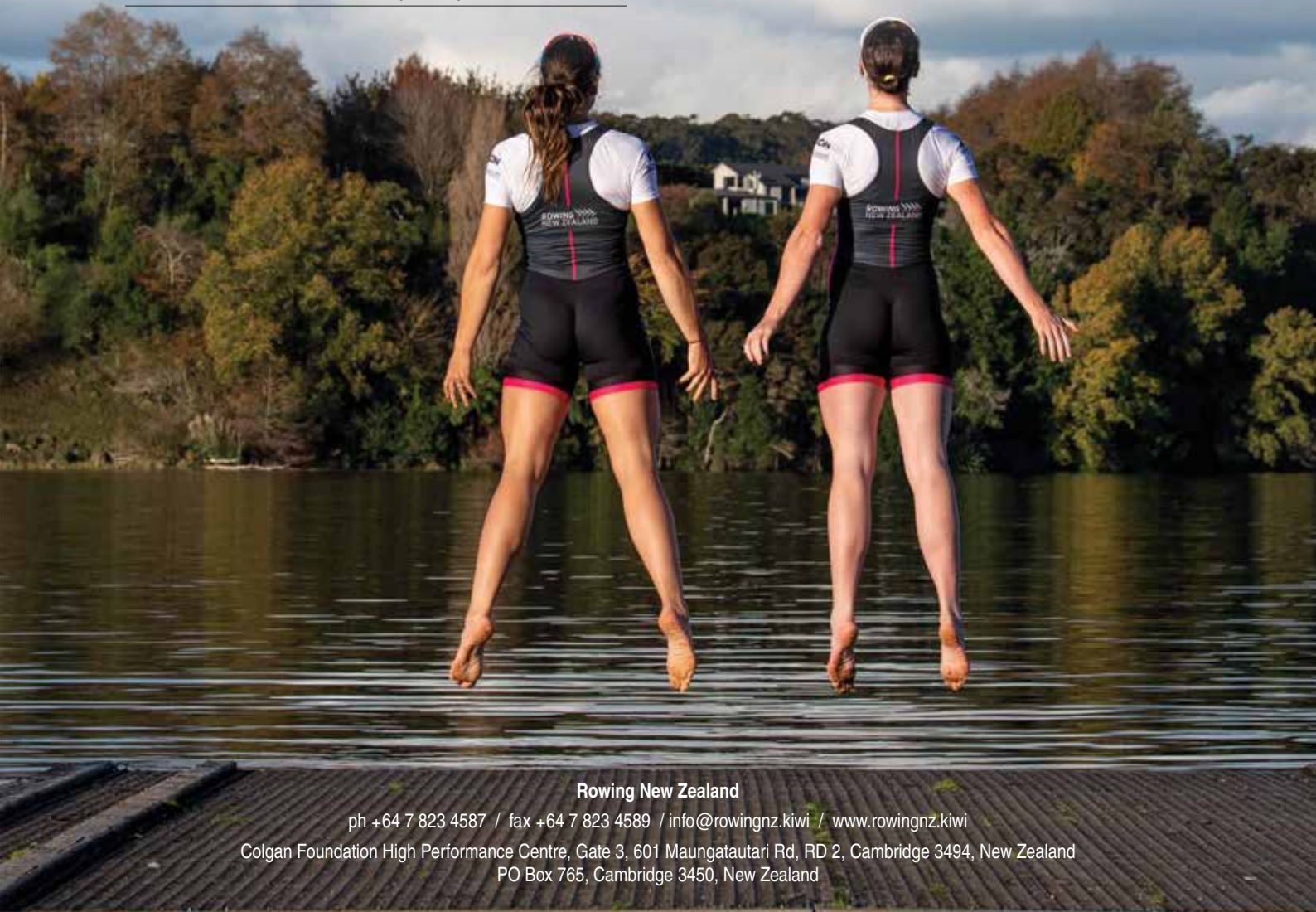

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# CHAIRPERSON AND CE REPORT 2022

New Zealand Rowing Association Incorporated, trading as Rowing New Zealand (RNZ), is the National Sports Organisation (NSO) for all rowing in New Zealand, as recognised by Sport New Zealand (SNZ), High Performance Sport New Zealand (HPSNZ), the New Zealand Olympic Committee (NZOC) and the New Zealand Paralympic Committee (PNZ), representing the interests of school, university, club, para, masters, indoor and coastal rowing.

RNZ is a member of World Rowing, the international governing body for rowing. World Rowing sponsors the programme for the Summer Olympics including running the qualification programme to select Games participants. In addition, World Rowing organises the World Cup, World Championships, World U19 Championships, World U23 Championships, World Coastal Championships, World Beach Sprint finals, World Indoor Championships, World Masters Regatta and World Sprints.

The primary objective of RNZ is to foster and promote the sport of rowing in New Zealand in all its forms and classifications.

RNZ's purpose is to make Aotearoa the best rowing nation in the world. Its vision is to create a positive rowing legacy for current and future generations through connection, growth and inspiration.

2022 was significantly affected by COVID with restrictions / responses in place that resulted in fewer opportunities for rowers to perform in a variety of environments. We focused during the year on further development of athlete

pathways and the implementation of IDPs (Individual Development Plans) for those in both the elite and pathway environment. This included an increased focus on Athlete Wellbeing.

It's important to acknowledge South Island Rowing (SIR) and its many very special people who ensured that RNZ's major national regattas (the New Zealand Championships and the Aon Maadi Secondary Schools Championships) were able to go ahead in 2022. The 'can-do' approach helped ensure that these critical regattas were successfully delivered under trying conditions.

The rowing community (rowers, coaches, administrators, officials, volunteers, schools, and clubs) have done a wonderful job in sustaining the sport through some very challenging years.

## GOVERNANCE

The Board continued to provide strong organisational leadership in challenging times. An important contributing factor to the Board's success was the balance of experienced and new directors as the sport looks ahead to the next decade.

At the 2022 RNZ Annual General Meeting in Nelson, Gerry Dwyer stepped down after an extended period as Chair of RNZ. During Gerry's tenure, RNZ has experienced many successes culminating with the 2020 (21) Olympic Games in Tokyo. Thanks Gerry for your leadership and contribution over the years.

Two other directors – Hayden Dillon and Raechel Cummins retired at the AGM after giving outstanding service.

Gerry's retirement from the Board was



as Chair of RNZ. Jane, an appointed Director, is in her third year on the Board and becomes the first woman to Chair RNZ. Other appointments at the 2022 AGM were Kim Dowden and Tim Babbage as elected Directors and Virginia Le Bas and Thornton Williams as appointed Directors.

The Board has progressed two important strategic projects in 2022:

### Statement of Strategic Intent 2022 – 2032

Adopted by the Board post the 2022 AGM, this extensively-consulted document outlined the strategic direction for RNZ over the next decade. This period includes three Olympic Games (Paris, Los Angeles and Brisbane) along with other identified opportunities to enhance the sport across communities in Aotearoa.

### Digital Transformation Project

With investment in excess of \$500,000 from Sport New Zealand, this mahi will modernise critical digital tools for RNZ and the rowing community. The project will take three years to complete and is a critical enabler for the successful delivery of the outcomes in the Statement of Strategic Intent.

### Innovation

The emergence of coastal rowing at community and performance levels of the sport is an exciting opportunity for RNZ. With Coastal Sprint Rowing likely to be part of the Olympic Games programme in 2028, decisions need to be made in 2023 as to how RNZ will progress its engagement with the new form of rowing.

### PERFORMANCE AND DEVELOPMENT

The season post the Tokyo Olympics has been challenging. RNZ had tima compete at World Cups, World Championships (Open, U23 and U19) and the U21 Trans-Tasman. While there were some outstanding individual performances, the overall results reflected the ongoing impacts and disruptions as a result of Covid.

Two legends of the sport retired during the season — Grace Prendergast MNZM and Hamish Bond CNZM. Grace won gold and silver medals at Tokyo and five gold and three silver medals at six World Championships. Hamish won a gold medal at each of the 2012, 2016 and 2020 Olympics and eight gold medals at World Championships between 2007 and 2015. We thank Grace and Hamish and wish them well for their future.

One of the key decisions the Board made in 2022 was how the Performance and Development programmes would better embrace athletes based overseas, especially in the USA. The employment of an International Pathway Lead (Fiona Bourke) in December 2022 will see better engagement and inclusion of those athletes who choose to progress their development overseas.

### COMMUNITY

2022 was very much a game of two halves: In the first quarter, SIR navigated its way through Covid-19 and had, with appropriate adaptations, a very full and competitive season, including hosting the transferred New Zealand Championships and the Maadi Secondary Schools Championships. Karāpiro Rowing (KRI) provided a limited programme for the North Island rowers.

The fourth quarter of 2022 saw the back end of Covid and the resurgence of rowing in schools and clubs – setting the sport up for a great competition season in 2023. KRI delivered a successful 2022 New Zealand Masters Championships in September.

Much of the rowing development offered by RNZ was delivered online and it was great to see some of the coach development initiatives bring the participants back to the Colgan Foundation High Performance Centre towards the end of 2022.

### MANAGEMENT

There were some staffing changes in 2022 and RNZ acknowledges the contribution of those who left in this period – Annika Wing, Tina Ryan, Michele Munro, Nick Barton, Gail Nell and Claire Davenport.

We have recruited well and the following joined RNZ: Janey Charlton, Louise Storey, Maxine Hughes, Kate Adams and Lorenz Kissling. At the end of 2022, financial services were being provided by BDO Tauranga. This will continue into 2023 until the Board is clear on the future structure and support needs of the finance function.

RNZ's mahi is supported by a highly-capable tima of support service staff from High Performance Sport New Zealand. With physiologists, physiotherapists, nutritionists, strength and conditioning, performance scientists, intelligence analysts, life advisors, massage therapists, sports medicine and health operations support our athletes and coaches are very well supported.

### PARTNERSHIPS

RNZ achieves nothing without the support of an extensive group of stakeholders.

RNZ is the sum total of all the rowers, coaches, officials, administrators and volunteers in schools, clubs, associations and affiliates across Aotearoa. It is a subjective assessment, but I feel that the relationship and engagement we have with many of you has improved during 2022. While RNZ's 'connectivity' with the rowing community has some way to go, it is a key outcome in RNZ's Statement of Strategic Intent, and we hope to build on the last 12 months.

Judy and Derek Jones continue to be generous supporters of RNZ having supported the organisation for a long time, starting with their connection with rowing through BankLink and then through their own business Rocket Foods.

Aon New Zealand has renewed its sponsorship for a further two years. This will extend the partnership to 17 years – one of the longest commercial/sport partnerships in Aotearoa. We acknowledge the commitment of Geoff Blampied who has been Aon New Zealand's Chief Executive throughout this sponsorship. RNZ was advised of Geoff's retirement at the end of 2022. We thank him for his support and wish him and his whanau well for the future.

Kerridge & Partners are in the second year of their partnership with RNZ – and we recognise their support.

776BC are also moving into the second season of their support of rowing in Aotearoa and the quality of their mahi can be seen with the clothing being supplied at our national regattas and to our national tima.

The Colgan Foundation continues to support the High Performance Centre at Karāpiro. Bibi and Sean Colgan also support other projects beyond their contribution to the facilities at Karāpiro.

We also receive excellent support from Sport New Zealand Ihi Aotearoa (SNZ) and High Performance Sport New Zealand (HPSNZ). Their support goes much further than the significant investment in our development and performance programmes from HPSNZ. SNZ has committed investment of over \$500,000 in RNZ's digital transformation project and we get the benefit of support from a wide range of quality specialist staff across both SNZ and HPSNZ.

Off the back of our most successful Olympic performance last year, 2022 was a rebuilding year with a number of challenges presented. Covid-19 continued to be present within the NZ community and did have an impact on our team. We continued to say goodbye to a number of athletes who chose to retire and there were a number of staff changes within Rowing NZ and HPSNZ. Personnel changes within the HP Programme are not unusual at the end of an Olympic cycle, but these changes saw a lot of experience leave our organisation. The NZ Government started a stepped approach to opening our borders and international travel started to resume.

## ELITE SELECTION CHANGES

One recommendation from our Tokyo Olympic review identified the need to evolve the way we select our Elite team. Three key themes emerged within the recommendations:

1. Selection Process and Evidence.
2. Communication.
3. Panel Roles and Influence.

This year we introduced a Performance Assessment Panel (PAP) which recommends the squads/crews for consideration to our Elite Selection Panel (ESP). The ESP makes the final decision.

Athletes and coaches were the drivers of this change. Data from our daily training environment was fed into our intelligence model. This allowed us to track individual and crew progress against key benchmarks developed from more than 20 years of data on our previous World and Olympic Champions. We will continue to review and enhance this process to ensure a fair and transparent selection process for our elite team.

## COVID-19

We were fortunate to have a dream run into the 2021 Tokyo Olympics, but 2022 was quite a different year. Our team was not immune, and between February and July the programme was heavily affected by people being out due to Covid. This affected training and the ability to run our Elite trials.

Restrictions on event size led to the National Championships being relocated from Lake Karāpiro to Lake Ruataniwha, with the South Island able to set up distinct pods to keep competitors separated. The event was run under strict Covid protocols. Due to the challenges with Covid and the upcoming international tour, our athlete group made the decision not to attend Nationals.

## HPSNZ INVESTMENT AND ATHLETE SUPPORT CHANGES

In late December 2021, HPSNZ announced its direct investment into sports with Rowing designated a Podium Sport – Olympic Individual. Rowing had confirmed an annual investment by HPSNZ of \$5.77 million per annum between 2022-2024 to run its High Performance Programme. Key strategic shifts with which we were to align included Wellbeing and Engagement, Performance Pathways and a Targeted Investment Framework.

HPSNZ also introduced a new TAPS system (Tailored Athlete Pathway Support) on 1 January 2022, intended to support athlete wellbeing by providing increased support. There are two grant levels designated Base Training Grant (BTG) and Development Training Grant (DTG). Rowing NZ offers an additional top-up to our athletes to support their training. Athletes through their performances at benchmark/pinnacle events can earn an excellence grant which is additional to the BTG.

## WELLBEING

In mid-November 2022, we welcomed Louise Storey to the role of Athlete Wellbeing Lead. Louise was part of the NZ Rowing team as an athlete, from 2009-2015.

Rowing NZ continues to update its induction processes and in 2022 a formal induction was implemented for all athletes entering the High Performance programme. The purpose of these inductions was to connect athletes to Rowing NZ's values and expectations and ease their transition into the High Performance Programme. This included each athlete for U19s, U21s and U23s receiving a booklet and workshops aimed at developing relevant areas for the age and stage of their rowing career.

After a successful Tokyo campaign, all longstanding members of the NZ Rowing team were offered individualised return-to-rowing plans to allow for longer breaks away from the building. It was recognised that having a longer break may allow these rowers time to come back refreshed and ready to commit to another campaign.

Performance conversations have been adapted to be more athlete-centric, with a clear focus on individual development. Wellbeing topics are an important part of the conversation and include rowing/life balance and planning on how HPSNZ support services such as physiotherapy, physiology, nutrition, performance life and psychology can best be utilised to assist individual athletic performance.

Rowing NZ, together with HPSNZ,



was privileged to support two athletes as they navigated training and competing through pregnancy and into motherhood. This is an exciting new phase of our HP Programme as motherhood should not be seen as a barrier to participation in sport at the highest level.

As we are an outdoor sport in New Zealand with its harsh sun, Rowing NZ supported skin cancer screening for all Elite and Elite Development athletes, coaches and staff. The screening will

continue annually.

How Rowing NZ incorporates athlete voice into decision-making is continually being developed. In 2022, athletes were informed of key decisions and the reasoning behind them in the areas of selection guidelines, strategy, athlete contracts, sponsorship and commercial partnerships, and performance conversations. Both athlete and coaching groups were consulted to determine preferences with coach and crew allocation. Staff and



athletes collaborated on tour planning and uniform design. Athletes were empowered to organise their own crews for Nationals.

## WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

We are calling the three-year strategy for the Paris Olympics the 3Ps: 2022 Prepare, 2023 Perform and 2024 Peak. 2022 was the first year of the programme. Our age-group teams had been starved of international competition in 2020 and 2021 so 2022 was about giving our developing elite athletes the opportunity to mix with our returning Olympians to send an elite team overseas to 'prepare' the foundation for this Olympic cycle. Our team competed at World Cup II, Henley Royal Regatta and World Cup III before returning to New Zealand to prepare for the World Championships in Racice, Czech Republic. We had 10 crews competing, achieving one gold (W2-), one silver (W1x) and one bronze (LW1x). Other A Finalists included our M1x (4th) and M2- (6th).

Our U23 and U19 teams returned to international competition with a combined World Championships in Varese, Italy.

The U23s began their squad training at Karāpiro in April. Covid affected their ability to train in crews and establish combinations.

Three US-based athletes joined the team in New Zealand three weeks before departing and five more arrived for a pre-competition training camp in Pusiano, Italy. The final crews were determined in Pusiano. This provided a steppingstone of our overseas-based athlete strategy to ensure we have the best athletes representing New Zealand on the world stage. Notable results from the nine crews included the M4- winning silver, the M4x winning bronze and the M4+ and W4+ finishing 6th in their respective finals.

We sent a larger than usual U19 team, which included a W8+, W4x, W2-, M4x, M4-, M2x and a spare W2-. Travel restrictions and our border closures meant it was the first taste of international racing for any of these rowers since the U19 World Championships in 2019.

The campaign involved three regional camps in Blenheim, Christchurch and Cambridge before crews headed to Europe to join the U23s in Pusiano. The team then relocated to Varese for the U19 World Championships. There were strong performances from the W8+, which finished 5th, and W2- which was 6th. The group showed a lot of resilience and with a large number eligible to row U19 in 2023, the future looks bright.

## U21 COMPETITION IN AUSTRALIA

Our U21 New Zealand team competed against Australia in Canberra between June 16-18. The team raced well despite flu affecting a number of the athletes. Big boats were the focus of the regatta. While the results didn't go our way, the team learnt a lot having had little international competition over the past two years due to Covid.

## NATIONAL PATHWAY

The National Pathway continues to evolve as Rowing New Zealand works with clubs, associations and HPSNZ to define how the Pathway can help develop athletes throughout the year. Over the winter of 2022, Rowing NZ supported the associations with funding to run winter training programmes for pathway and non-pathway athletes.

## OTAGO

Winter Regional Coach Matt Adam coached the Winter HP Programme based at Otago University RC, catering for 20 selected athletes. This included on-water coaching, ergs, weights and nutrition for university students and Year 13 athletes named as U19 trialists.

## OTAGO + SOUTHLAND

Year 12 Development Camps in Arrowtown (cancelled due to weather) and Dunedin. Winter Regional Coaches Matt Adam and John Morrison assisted National Pathway Lead Fiona Bourke to deliver camps focused on providing technical feedback, creating connections with athletes across the region and learning new skills (nutrition, athlete life, physio).

## AUCKLAND

Assisted with selection of Winter Regional





Coaches Sam Jackson and Anna DeLong to deliver the Open Blues programme. This included weekly on-water and erg sessions and strength and conditioning at AUT Millennium. Athletes participated in two weekend camps attended by a National Pathway Coach.

#### DECEMBER DEVELOPMENT CAMP

Three-day camp at Lake Karāpiro for US-based athletes nominating for 2023 U23 team and NZ-based athletes from 2022 U23 team still eligible for 2023 U23s. This was an opportunity to assess on-water ability compared to NZ athletes, provide technical feedback (including force gate analysis), and expose athletes to the HP environment. 26 athletes attended.

#### JANUARY TRAINING

US-based athletes no longer eligible for U23s returned for seven days' training immersion with the Elite Development Squad (EDS) group. In addition, three

sweep men and one sweep woman were invited to extended training with the Summer Squad. This enabled us to assess ability against current EDS athletes and highlight expectations post-graduation.

#### WELLINGTON, MARLBOROUGH

Brooke Walker and Ella Pudney ran the Winter Programme in Wellington, Seán O'Neill and Joe Bennion the programmes in Nelson and Blenheim and Phillipa Baker had a group of younger athletes in the Whanganui region. Phillipa did a great job and was able to take a group of athletes to the North Island Interregionals in Hawke's Bay.

Nick Barton left his Pathway Coach role at the end of winter and in October we welcomed Janey Charlton to the Athlete Development role. The Pathway team put together a USA Strategy, which was accepted by the Rowing NZ Board. This has resulted in the formation of an International

Pathway arm and the appointment of Fiona Bourke to the International Pathway Lead role. Fiona will work closely with athletes who have chosen to row overseas as well as providing guidance to those who are looking into options overseas. This move will also see Rowing NZ run its first ever US-based U23 trial in June 2023, giving those athletes studying in the US the opportunity to represent NZ on the world stage.

During the 2022/2023 regatta season, the Pathway team offered coaching at Lake Ruataniwha on the Thursday and Friday before each regatta. The Avon High Performance group attended as did Juliette Alm-Lequeux, Logan Docherty and Fred Vavasour. These sessions proved to be popular and successful.

An updated Pathway list was put out in November 2022, along with new selection guidelines, which will now see intakes onto the Pathway every April and October.

## COACHING

### PRIME MINISTER'S SCHOLARSHIP – PATHWAY TO PODIUM

In 2022, the Prime Minister's Scholarship changed to reflect a new programme from High Performance Sport NZ called Core Knowledge. After a successful pilot in 2021, Core Knowledge was offered nationwide as an education programme to support National Sporting Organisations to develop coaches in the early stages of their high performance pathway careers.

The initiative aims to provide coaches with the core knowledge and critical skills they need to help ensure athletes receive not just quality coaching, but the overall holistic support they need to be successful. Seventy coaches from 10 NSOs were involved in the Core Knowledge pilot with 196 coaches from 25 NSOs registered for the 2022 programme. Rowing put forward 27 coaches for the 2022 intake, the highest number of any NSO. The course structure is aimed at covering the following 4 domains of coaching.

- Body in Motion – “Performance and Technique Analysis”
- Energy Systems – “Physiology and Energy Systems”

- Professional Practice – “Leading Change, Leading a Growth Culture”
- Performance Impact – “Intra/ Interpersonal Skills – Who am I, Who are You, Who are We?”

From a Rowing NZ coach development perspective, this programme is a big step forward and offers excellent educational opportunities for all our developing performance coaches across the country. It also offers great opportunities for coaches to meet and connect with their counterparts in other codes.

### PRIME MINISTER'S SCHOLARSHIP – CAREER COACH

2022 saw the completion of the Career Coach cohort #2. This group, like the first cohort, advanced the diversity of high performance coaching in New Zealand, by supporting a second group of 10 female coaches through a series of development workshops.

For a second time, the course was blessed with a newborn baby attending the residential workshops, with Alice Denyer bringing her new baby boy along. Unfortunately, the constant presence of Covid throughout 2022 affected a number

of workshops and attendance was lower than expected.

That said, the feedback from cohort 2, showed that the coaches felt the programme had improved their confidence and that they would be more willing to apply for an age-group coaching position. This was then reflected in our 2022 New Zealand Age Group teams with, 50% of the teams being made up of female coaches. Of these coaches and managers, all bar one had been part of the Career Coach cohort.

### TE HĀPAITANGA

Te Hāpaitanga is a holistic coach development initiative designed to enable more women to pursue and maintain a career in high performance coaching in Aotearoa New Zealand. The 18-month initiative provides a range of opportunities that enable future or emerging female high performance coaches to test and develop their coaching ability and develop new skills to navigate a complex and challenging career in high performance sport.

In 2022, Hannah Starnes completed her TH journey and Fiona Bourke (appointed 2021) continued with hers. In November 2022, applications for a third cohort of this initiative opened and Rowing NZ was lucky

to have two new coaches accepted:

- Janey Charlton – President of the NZSSRA, former Director of Rowing at St Peter's Cambridge and NZ U23 Representative coach and now Athlete Development Manager with Rowing New Zealand.
- Anna DeLong – Former North Shore RC Head Coach and now Waikato Rowing Club Assistant Coach, and NZ U21 Coach.

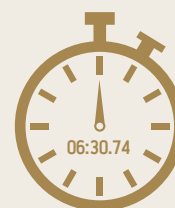

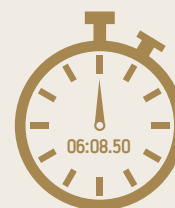

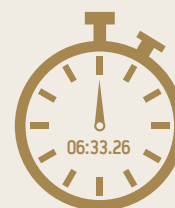

# COMMUNITY ROWING REPORT 2022



We all hoped 2022 would bring an end to the Covid challenges we'd experienced over the past two years. Sadly, it didn't quite happen that way.

Covid continued to challenge us all, limiting the ability of North Island clubs and schools to train leading into the 2021/2022 summer and affecting regattas across New Zealand. Lessons learnt from the past years were enacted quickly and regattas were run under the Covid Protection Framework. Credit should be given to our clubs, race officials, coaches and athletes for being resilient in what was a tricky and challenging year.

While it was difficult to deliver regattas, it wasn't impossible.

Our 2022 Rocket Foods New Zealand Rowing Championships went ahead after being moved from Lake Karāpiro to Twizel. The zone system worked very well for the 900 rowers in what was a very successful regatta.

The 2022 Aon Maadi Regatta was also delivered in Twizel with just on 1500 secondary school rowers making their way to Lake Ruataniwha. Rowing was one of a very small group of college sports able to complete their national championships during the traditional school's tournament week. The regatta didn't cater for Under 15's (due to managing Covid) but despite that, was a huge success. We must

acknowledge the work South Island Rowing put into the successful delivery of both regattas.

The New Zealand Masters Championships in September were staged without any real Covid restrictions. Thank you to KRI for hosting and helping make this such a successful regatta.

The New Zealand University Championships also went ahead in September after being postponed due to Covid restrictions. A special thank you to all those involved, especially the Whanganui Rowing Association, which helped make this such a successful event.

Our coaching courses during 2022 proved to be popular, with 89 coaches educated and trained at different levels. We also qualified 16 new race officials.

On behalf of Rowing New Zealand, I would like to acknowledge the work the Community Rowing Committee has done and for its support through what was a very challenging year.

The committee, which is made up of representatives from each association, meets on a regular basis to discuss all things community rowing, providing feedback and ideas to the Rowing New Zealand team.

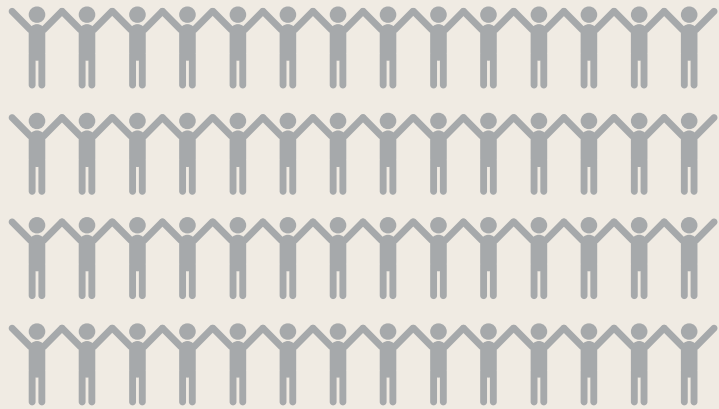

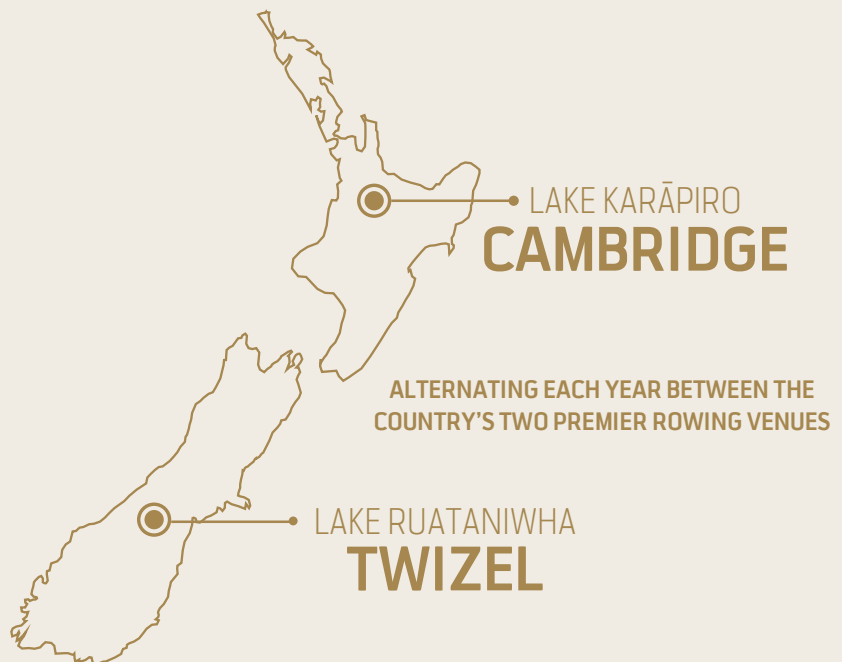

# MASTERS ROWING REPORT 2022



Masters Rowing in New Zealand continues to grow headcount at club level – both returning rowers and new masters taking learn to row courses.

**N**ew and revived groups are being established in clubs such as Porirua Rowing Club where 40 people learned to row and 20 of these have joined the club in the past year.

In collaboration with the Legion of Rowers, Rowing NZ invited a representative (Rebecca Caroe) to join the Community Rowing Committee to provide a voice for masters alongside provincial reps. Topics such as Masters novice status and a pathway for new masters into age group competition have been discussed by the group.

The Legion of Rowers runs a monthly newsletter for masters, this has included promoting upcoming masters regattas, regatta reports and coaching advice articles. The Oarsport Magazine regularly ran articles for masters edited by Imogen Coxhead and new RowingHub website will carry more articles on coaching masters, ways to row with “adaptations” for aging athletes, and how to run a masters group at your club.

Masters have started to innovate with new events during the year. Two masters-only camps were hosted at Dunstan Arm and St George Rowing Clubs, both selling out. Interest in travel alongside rowing has led to groups from each island attending the other’s championships – notably South Island Masters Championships where Cambridge, West End, North Shore, and Mercer RC were in attendance. Many masters have also taken part in coastal and touring rowing events and a strong masters entry for the new Auckland Beach Sprints in April 2023 has been received.

Challenges for Rowing New Zealand and club committees come from three areas – how to handle the large number of new rowers into a club and integrate them into experienced training groups, non-traditional methods to provide coaching for masters, and ways to enable fair racing for athletes after their novice year when drawn in age group events against former Olympians.

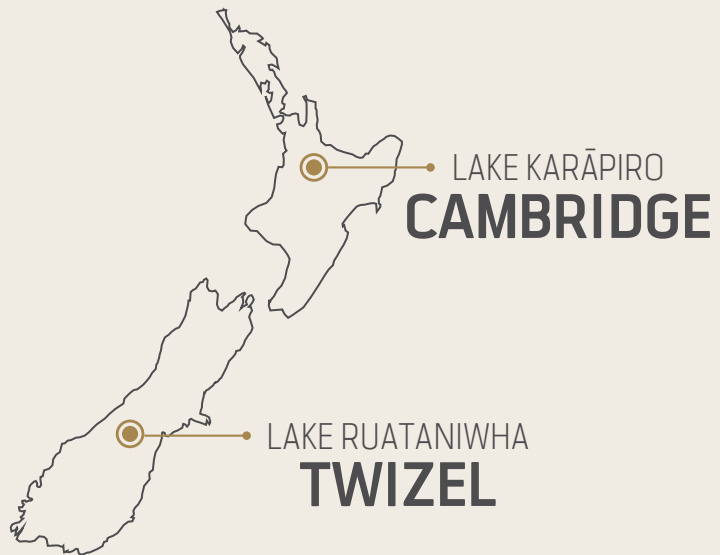

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# Statement of Service Performance

For the year ended 31 December 2022

## Description of the entity's outcomes

New Zealand Rowing Association Incorporated trading as Rowing New Zealand (RNZ) is the national sports organisation (NSO) for all rowing in New Zealand, as recognised by Sport New Zealand (SNZ), High Performance Sport New Zealand (HPSNZ), the New Zealand Olympic Committee (NZOC) and the New Zealand Paralympic Committee (PNZ), representing the interests of school, university, club, para, masters, indoor and coastal rowing.

RNZ is a member of World Rowing, the international governing body for rowing. World Rowing sponsors the programme for the Summer Olympics including running the qualification programme to select Games participants. In addition, World Rowing organises the World Rowing Cup, World Rowing Championships, World Rowing Junior Championships, World Rowing U23 Championships, World Rowing Coastal Championships, World Rowing Beach Sprint finals, World Rowing Indoor Championships, World Rowing Masters Regatta and World Rowing Sprints.

The primary objective of RNZ is to foster and promote the sport of rowing in New Zealand in all its forms and classifications.

RNZ's purpose is to be the best rowing nation in the world. Its vision is to create a positive rowing legacy for current and future generations through connection, growth and inspiration.

2022 has continued to be affected by COVID with restrictions/responses in place that have resulted in fewer opportunities for rowers to perform in a variety of environments. We have focused during the year on further development of athlete pathways and the implementation of IDP's (Individual Development Plans) for Athletes both in the elite environment and those athletes now part of the pathways and increased focus on Athlete Wellbeing.

# Notes to the Accounts

For the year ended 31 December 2022

## Reporting Entity

New Zealand Rowing Association Incorporated ("Rowing New Zealand") is an incorporated society under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. The financial statements of Rowing New Zealand for the year ended 31 December 2022 comprise of Rowing New Zealand, and the consolidated financial statements of the Group. "The Group" comprises of Rowing New Zealand and its controlled entity New Zealand Rowing Foundation Inc ("the Foundation"). The principal aim of Rowing New Zealand and the Group is to foster and promote the sport of rowing in New Zealand in all its forms and classifications.

## Statement of Compliance

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand (NZ GAAP). In the case of Rowing New Zealand and the Group, NZ GAAP is International Public Sector Accounting Standards as appropriate for Tier 2 Not-for-profit, Public Benefit Entities applying the Reduced Disclosure Regime (PBE Standards RDR). Rowing New Zealand and the Group have taken all disclosure concessions available. Rowing New Zealand and the Group are eligible to apply PBE Standards RDR as they have less than \$30 million annual expenditure.

## Basis of preparation

The accounting policies detailed in the following notes have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by the Group.

The Group controls an entity when it has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of the entity so as to benefit from its activities. Under PBE IPSAS 6 Rowing New Zealand is considered to have control over the Foundation as Rowing New Zealand receives the majority of the benefits of the Foundation and appoints the majority of the governing body.

The financial statements of Rowing New Zealand and the Group have been prepared using the going concern assumption. The measurement basis adopted is that of historical cost, other than the revaluation of foreign exchange contracts and equity and debt instruments.

## Significant Accounting Policies

The following specific policies have been applied to all aspects of these financial statements:

### (a) Presentation Currency

The presentation currency and functional currency is the New Zealand Dollar. All amounts have been presented in New Zealand Dollars (rounded to the nearest dollar).

### (b) GST

Except for trade receivables and trade payables which are stated inclusive of GST, all amounts have been reported exclusive of GST.

### (c) Taxation

Rowing New Zealand has an exemption from income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007 as a body promoting amateur games or sports. As such no income tax is payable.

The Foundation has charitable status and is exempt from income tax.

## 2 Revenue Recognition

### Revenue from exchange transactions

Exchange transactions are those where the Group receives value (cash or other assets) and gives something (usually goods or services) of approximately equal value in return.

The Group receives exchange revenue from a number of sources. This revenue relates largely to services provided by Rowing New Zealand. These services include international tours for selected athletes, sponsorship benefits to commercial partners, member benefits for licensed rowers and coach development programs for athletes, schools, clubs and universities.

The Group recognises revenue from providing these services in proportion to the stage of completion of the transaction at the reporting date.

### Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where the Group receives value (cash or other assets) without giving approximately equal value in return. The Group receives non-exchange revenue in the form of government funding, grants, philanthropic funding and donations.

Cash or other assets received from non-exchange transactions are recognised as either revenue or a liability at the reporting date. The specific recognition criteria in relation to the Group's non-exchange transactions are:

#### - Government Funding and Grants

The recognition of government funding and grants depends on whether the revenue comes with any 'conditions' or 'restrictions'.

If the revenue comes with 'conditions' that specifically require the Group to return the grant if the grant is not used in the way stipulated it is initially recognised as a liability. It is subsequently recognised as non-exchange revenue when the 'conditions' are satisfied.

'Restrictions' that do not specifically require the Group to return the cash or asset if it is not utilised in the way stipulated do not result in the recognition of a non-exchange liability. Such funding or grants are immediately recognised as non-exchange revenue.

#### - Philanthropic Funding and Donations

Philanthropic funding and donations are voluntary transfers of cash, other monetary assets, goods or services that the Group receives which are free from conditions or restrictions. Philanthropic funding and donations are recognised as revenue at their fair value at the date the funding is received.

## 4 Cash and Short-Term Deposits

Cash and bank equivalents comprise cash and call accounts and other deposits held with financial institutions with maturity dates less than 3 months. Short term deposits include all cash investments with maturities between 3 and 12 months. The average interest rate prevailing on cash and short-term deposits at 31 December 2022 was 0.5% (2021: 0.05%).

The philanthropic funding account is used for the purpose of receiving donations from philanthropists. Donated funds are used in accordance with the wishes of the donor. Board approval is required to allocate funds from this account. There is no obligation to repay the funds.

The liquidity account is used to ensure that Rowing New Zealand has ready access to liquid assets to sustain operations in the event of significant unanticipated increases in operating expenses or decreases in revenue to enable the organisation to preserve its capacity to deliver the domestic rowing programme and support the high-performance programme. Funds can only be transferred out of this account in particular circumstances and with Board approval.

At each balance date the carrying value of the Sport New Zealand loan is determined based on the discounted cash flows of the expected repayments for the loan. Rowing New Zealand must exercise judgement to determine both the expected future cash flows and the appropriate discount rate to apply to each loan. When doing this Rowing New Zealand takes into account the expected repayment term. During 2022 Rowing New Zealand was not required to make a loan repayment under the agreed repayment calculation formula. Based on the formula, Rowing New Zealand also does not expect to make a repayment during 2023. As at 31 December 2022 the balance of the loan has been written down to nil based on forecast future cashflows.

## 9 Foreign Currency Transactions and Financial Instruments

Rowing New Zealand is subject to foreign currency risk when purchasing equipment and attending regattas outside New Zealand. Where exposure to foreign currency is certain, it is Rowing New Zealand's policy to reduce the uncertainty around exchange rates using forward exchange contracts and foreign currency bank accounts.

The Group may hold derivative financial instruments to hedge its foreign currency. Derivatives are initially measured at fair value; any directly attributable transaction costs are recognised in surplus or deficit as incurred. Subsequent to initial recognition, derivatives are measured at fair value, and changes therein are recognised in surplus or deficit.

As at 31 December 2022 commitments on forward exchange contracts totalled \$ nil (2021: \$ nil).

# Notes to the Accounts

For the year ended 31 December 2022

New Zealand Secondary Schools Rowing Association paid \$33,455 to Rowing New Zealand for association levies and Maadi Cup regatta entry fees. Rowing New Zealand paid \$12,500 to New Zealand Secondary Schools Rowing Association for NZSS Championship delivery. Bruce Tong and Kim Dowden are the Rowing New Zealand board members and board members of New Zealand Secondary Schools Rowing Association.

Marlborough Rowing Association paid \$687 for coach education program and levies to Rowing New Zealand. Rowing New Zealand paid \$2,237 to Marlborough Rowing Association to host AGM and a pathway camp. Tim Babbage is a Rowing New Zealand board member and was a president of Marlborough Rowing Association until September 2022.

Auckland Rowing Association paid \$687 for coach education program and levies to Rowing New Zealand. Rowing New Zealand paid \$6,325 to Auckland Rowing Association to host a pathway camp. Kim Dowden is a Rowing New Zealand board member and was a board member of Auckland Rowing Association until December 2022.

Auckland Grammar Rowing Club paid \$7,268 to Rowing New Zealand for competition licenses. Mathew Jensen is a Rowing New Zealand board member and head coach of Auckland Grammar Rowing Club.

Rowing New Zealand paid \$1,000 to Auckland University Boat Club for university rowing development. Mathew Jensen is a Rowing New Zealand board member and coach of Auckland University Boat Club.

## Key Management Personnel

Compensation of the Group's key management personnel includes salaries and non-cash benefits. The Group has recognised an expense of \$779,226 relating to compensation of key management personnel (2021: \$663,576).

## Controlled Entity

### NZ Rowing Foundation Incorporated

As at 31 December 2022, Jane Davel was Rowing New Zealand Chair in addition to being trustee of the Foundation.

Rowing New Zealand provides administrative services to the Foundation. Rowing New Zealand does not charge for these services or for other goods and services purchased on behalf of the Foundation.

## 12 Capital Fund

### 12a Net Surplus for the Year

With reference to Article 24.2 of the Constitution of the Foundation, the Board's policy is that all donations not tagged to a specific purpose (less an administration fee) are transferred to the Capital Fund at the end of the financial year. \$16,000 was allocated to the Capital Fund for the year ended 31 December 2022 (2021: \$19,000).

### 12b Transfer from Capital Fund to Accumulated Revenues and Expenses

In 2010 the Foundation lent Rowing New Zealand \$320,000. In December 2016 the Foundation converted this loan into a grant which was included in other income for Rowing New Zealand for the year ended December 2016. This amount was being carried forward in the group Capital Fund. This amount was transferred across to the Accumulated Revenue and Expenses account as at 31 December 2021 so as to accurately reflect the balance of the Capital Fund of the Foundation within the consolidated Group accounts.

As at 31 December 2022 the balance of the Capital Fund was \$ 300,681 (2021: \$ 284,681).



# Independent Auditor's Report

## Opinion

We are independent of the incorporated society and group in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 *International Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners (Including International Independence Standards)* (New Zealand) issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board and the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' *International Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (including International Independence Standards)* ('IESBA Code'), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA Code.

Our responsibilities under ISAs (NZ) and NZ AS 1 are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the incorporated society and group financial statements* section of our report.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, the incorporated society and group.

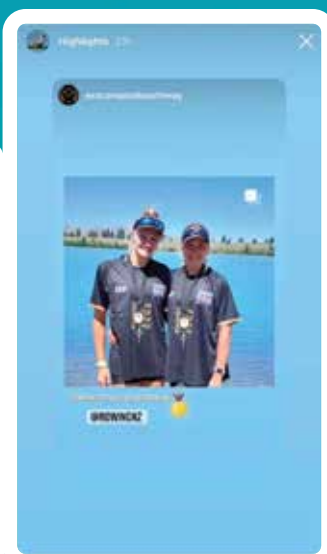

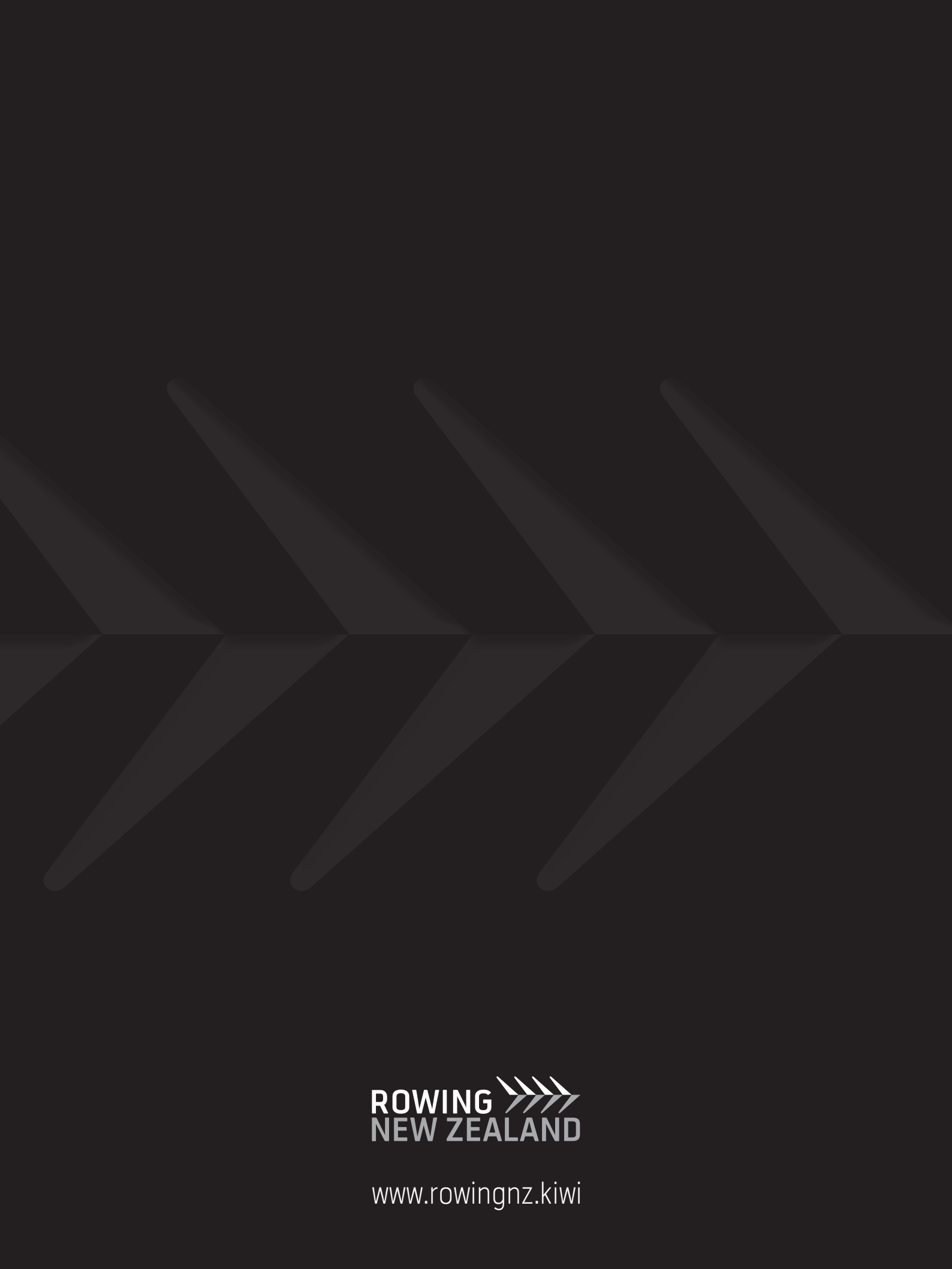
